# **Guests can stay** no longer than 30 days

There is a 30-day monthly limit for visitors. At the end of 30 days, the member is required to notify the site manager's office. A new household composition must be completed and the visitor must be in compliance with cooperative guidelines to gualify for occupancy.

A criminal background report is required for additions to the household composition and there is a charge for this report.

Failure to comply with the visitor policy will place the member in default.

# **Unlocked cars** are easy targets for thieves, vandals

Five cars were damaged in one week in January because they were left unlocked.

"Two cars were stolen and one was destroyed on the inside and is not drivable," said Tina Greene, site manager.

Two other cars had property stolen from inside.

Thieves and vandals can gain access to your car if it isn't locked.

They may tear up the interior, looking for spare change or valuables, or they may figure out how to move the car.

Locking isn't the only precaution. Remove any belongings from the car so thieves won't be tempted by what they see inside the vehicle.

## Keeping children safe

Unlocked cars also pose serious risks to children.

"Children may enter vehicles on their own while exploring or playing games like hide-and-seek," said Amber Rollins, director of Kids and Care Safety, based in Olathe.

Once inside, they may not be able to get out and can become trapped. This can be deadly in bitter winter weather as well as hot summer days.
