

Smoke Safely

Many things in the home can catch fire if they touch something hot like a cigarette or ashes.

So, it is always safer to smoke outside, cautioned the U.S. Fire Administration.

Yet, unattended or improperly discarded cigarettes can lead to grass fires and damage to property.

The U.S. Fire Administration offers these tips:

- Put cigarettes out all the way. Do this every time
- Don't walk away from lit cigarettes and other smoking materials.
- Put your cigarette out in an ashtray or bucket with sand.
- Before you throw cigarettes in the trash, put water on the ashes and butts to make sure they are really out.
