Board members present: Mike Gamble, president; Summer Bello,

Mike called the meeting to order at 5:45 p.m.

Minutes

The board voted to approve the minutes of the February 25 board meeting.

OPEN SESSION

Members signed in for the open session at 6 p.m.

Welcome

Mike welcomed them and announced the next board meeting to be April 15.

Site manager report

Danica reviewed the site manager's and maintenance reports.

Applications: two approved and three are in review. Move-ins: two in February; one in March; and four projected for May/June.

Maintenance update: 110 work orders currently open and 68 closed. Installed were one refrigerator, one water heater and one stove. Two roofs have been patched and the roof that was temporarily repaired is scheduled to be replaced during the refinance.

Managing agent update

Jozie reported that tree trimming is scheduled. All units are sold.

Mike opened the floor to member comments.

Anti-theft tips for Vehicles

Thefts from motor vehicles generally occur when criminals drive or walk through areas looking for vehicles that are unlocked or have objects left in view.

It only takes a few seconds for a thief to break into your vehicle.

By observing a few simple recommendations of the National Crime Prevention Council, you can take away the criminal's opportunity to make you a victim of this crime.

Always lock your vehicle with the windows rolled up.

The harder it is for a thief to get into your car, the more likely the thief will move on to the next car.

Almost half of the thefts from inside motor vehicles involve a vehicle that was left unlocked.

Don't leave anything of value inside the vehicle in plain sight.

This includes cell phones, radios, briefcases, purses, packages, compact disks and other valuables.

They should not be left in your car period. But if they are, they shouldn't be in view.

Items that you can't take with you should be locked in the trunk.

If you can't take your valuables with you when you leave your car, at least lock them in the trunk where they are more difficult to find and steal.

Don't leave you vehicle unoccupied with the keys in it.

Don't do this even for a moment. Why make it that easy for a criminal to drive off with your car?

This is especially true at convenience stores or with children in the car.

If you have an anti-theft device for your vehicle . . . use it.

If you have a car alarm, set it. If you have a



steering wheel "club," lock it in place correctly.

Make sure the license plates on your car are properly secured.

Make it difficult to remove your license plate by securing it tightly.

When your year sticker is in place, run a razor blade across it several times to make it more difficult to remove in one piece.

At night, park in well-lighted areas.

Not only will this deter thieves from stealing your car but you also will be safer when you return your vehicle.

Report all incidents as quickly as possible.

If you don't report a crime, the police won't know there is a problem.

Lawn mower, grass trimmer available to members

Members who need help keeping flower beds and back yards neat can check out a lawn mower and a hedge trimmer from the maintenance garage.

You also can check out a weed eater, rake, shovel and a hoe from the Maintenance shop.

Simply call the office and the maintenance garage will be notified. These tools can be checked out for two hours.

Members are reminded that they are responsible for mowing fenced back yards.

Grass must be no higher than six inches and the yard must be kept free of clutter.

If you receive notice from Maintenance to mow your yard, you will have five days to do so. If not mowed during this time, Maintenance will mow and a fee will be charged.

If you leave for vacation, remember to make arrangements to have your yard mowed while you are gone.

If Maintenance has to mow, your account will be billed for the service.

Change filters regularly to keep your furnace operating efficiently.


Light bulbs

These are not allowed to be placed on wooden decks.


These rules are necessary to comply with the property's insurance requirements.
